

Ben Haneman Memorial Student Prize

The ANZSHM established this Prize in honour of its late President, Dr Ben Haneman. The Prize is for students, as Ben Haneman passionately wished to encourage the next generation of researchers in the history of medicine. It is awarded for the best paper submitted by a postgraduate student at an ANZSHM conference.

The Prize is a book token or cheque for AU\$200 plus a year's ANZSHM membership. Judges will be a panel of three appointed by the Society's Executive. If the quality of entries warrants, there will be a shortlist of finalists. Each finalist who does not win the Prize will be awarded one year's membership of the ANZSHM. It is anticipated that normally there will be three finalists, along with the Prize winner. However, as necessary, the judges may decide not to award the Prize and their decision is final.

Eligible students may be full or part time and must provide evidence of their student status. Post-doctoral students are excluded. Papers eligible for the Prize must be solely authored by the student and based on the student's research. Any subsequent publications from the paper (in, for example, *Health and History*) may be dual-authored.

The deadline for submission of papers will normally be the first day of the conference, with the winner notified approximately a month later. The results will be announced in the *Medical History Newsletter* and on the ANZSHM website.

Submission Requirements

As the paper is for presentation in a standard twenty-minutes time slot, its length must be not more than 2,500-2,800 words at most. The paper should be fully documented with footnotes or endnotes. These are not counted in the word length, but should not be used to expand the paper unduly. A bibliography is optional.

Three copies of the paper, clearly marked with its title and with the author's name and contact details, must be handed in at the conference registration desk on the first day of the conference, before the conference program begins. There can be no subsequent amendment of the paper.
